Lifesaving message in a bottle

A "bizarre" idea to store a person's medical details in a bottle in the fridge could prove a "lifesaver". The voluntary scheme to use tiny green and white bottles which contain crucial details about a householder's medication, allergies and who to contact in case of an emergency, has been organised by Lions Clubs across the UK. The essential information will be easily accessed by paramedics and emergency crews in case of an accident or sudden illness. The Office has a few bottles available for interested members.

"ICE" (i.e. In Case of Emergency)

A campaign encouraging people to enter an emergency contact number in their mobile phone's memory under the heading "ICE" (i.e. In Case of Emergency), has rapidly spread throughout the world as a particular consequence of the terrorist attacks in London. Originally established as a nation-wide campaign in the UK, ICE allows paramedics or police to be able to contact a designated relative / next-of-kin in an emergency situation.

The idea is the brainchild of East Anglian Ambulance Service paramedic Bob Brotchie and was launched in May 2005. Bob, 41, who has been a paramedic for 13 years, said: "I was reflecting on some of the calls I've attended at the roadside where I had to look through the mobile phone contacts struggling for information on a shocked or injured person. Almost everyone carries a mobile phone now, and with ICE we'd know immediately who to contact and what number to ring. The person may even know of their medical history."

By adopting the ICE advice, your mobile will help the rescue services quickly contact a friend or relative - which could be vital in a life or death situation. It only takes a few seconds to do, and it could easily help save your life. Why not put ICE in your phone now? Simply select a new contact in your phone book, enter the word 'ICE' and the number of the person you wish to be contacted. For more than one contact name ICE1, ICE2, ICE3 etc." For further information, type in 'ICE - in case of emergency' onto your Internet server.

Profiles of Council members

Peter Woodsford – Director of Studies (Lectures)



Peter, who grew up in Dorset, began his association with Cambridge when he won an Open Exhibition at St. John's, graduating with an Honours Degree in Mathematics in 1963. In that year he took a step which had a major impact on his life – he went with the Voluntary Service Overseas organisation to Uganda, where he met and married his wife Sue, who was also with VSO. Peter taught maths and physics at Busoga College Mwiri, a leading school in the country. He and Sue returned to UK in 1967 but have maintained close ties with Uganda ever since and will be going there later this year for the Centennial celebrations of the school.

With a Diploma in Computer Science obtained with distinction back in Cambridge in 1968, he took up a research post in the University Computer Aided Design (CAD) group, where he wrote GINO, an innovative and widely used computer graphics

software package. He then joined Laser Scan, the first company on the Cambridge Science Park, where he was concerned with the development of computer mapping and geographic information systems. He retired in 2009 as Chairman of the company, then called 1Spatial. He is now non-executive chairman of Snowflake Software. Peter also played a leading part in industry bodies in the UK and Europe and held a visiting professorship in Geomatics Engineering at UCL. He was awarded an MBE for services to the geographic information industry in 2010.

Of his role in U3AC, which he joined in 2005, he says: "I have been a persistent German student, also active in Africa Forum, and I like to take on each year a subject of which I know little or nothing (eg Venerable Bede, Eminent Diarists, Happiness in Georgian London). I give a course entitled 'Maps in the Computer Age' and have organised the Heidelberg Exchange (2008-9)." His other interests include allotment gardening ("we have two"), cinema, cycling and travel (especially by train). Elected to the Council in 2010, he became Director of Studies (Lectures) this year. Asked what his plans were he said: "As well as seeking to maintain the high standards we have had in the past, I hope to make good use of our own members and of some academics at the beginnings of their careers in the programme of Wednesday lectures. I also hope to coordinate these with the Norah Boyce Science lectures".

Nicholas Herbert - member of Council



Nicholas Herbert (alias Lord Hemingford) was born in Watford and brought up in the Gold Coast, Uganda, Northumberland and Huntingdonshire. At school, at Oundle, he studied cricket and rugby, among other sports and at Clare, where he got an Honours degree in English in 1953, he continued this sporting interest, captaining the college at cricket and rowing in the First Lent boat.

Reuters News agency took him on to their sports desk in 1956, moving him a year later to cover the Foreign Office and in 1960, with his wife Jenny, to Washington to report on the White House, Congress and the State Department. Events that he covered for Reuters and *The Times*, which he joined in 1962, included the Kennedy-Nixon election, the Cuban missile crisis, the Kennedy assassination, the early space flights and the Martin Luther King marches in the South. As Middle East

Correspondent from 1965 to 1969 he covered the withdrawal from Aden and the Six Day War.

Back in Britain as editor of the *Cambridge Evening News*, he renewed his acquaintance with Cambridge, which he said he found just as complex as the Middle East. He was recruited to be editorial director of Westminster Press, a group of provincial papers, where he started an in-company journalism training scheme. As President of the Guild of British Newspaper Editors and a founder member of the Association of British Editors, he developed an interest in press freedom and co-authored two pamphlets on the subject. In retirement he was for 10 years Chairman of the East Anglian Regional Committee of the National Trust and served on the Council of the Friends of the British Library. In 2008 he published *Successive Journeys: A Family in Four Continents*, which won first prize for non-fiction in the Self-Publishing Awards and led to his being named joint self-publisher of the year.

He was elected to the U3AC Council in 2010 and helped to organise the official opening of the new Bridge Street premises. He is part of the group conducting research on care of the elderly and assists Peter Woodsford with the Wednesday lectures. He says he likes the organisation because it works absolutely without compulsion. "How many other organisations with 2,500 members are run so effectively by so many volunteers?" he asks.

Membership entitles you to apply for up to 6 courses, attend the Wednesday lectures and Norah Boyce science lectures (space permitting) and the opportunity to apply for various visits that are arranged throughout the year.

If you apply for only ONE course and that course has a limited number of places we cannot guarantee you a place on that course, so it is advisable to provide an alternative.

Annual subscription payments

Discretionary Fund

A Discretionary Fund is available for members who would find it difficult to pay the full annual subscription. To qualify for the reduced subscription of £10, members should be in receipt of either: pension credit, income support, incapacity benefit, employment and support allowance or job seekers allowance.
