Messages from members of Council

The 2013 – 2014 Programme of Studies accompanies this newsletter. There are 300 courses on offer giving members a wide and varied selection of choice, enough to titillate the imagination. Some of the courses are repeats of popular classes run in previous years but others are new to the programme providing opportunities to stimulate interest and curiosity in areas of study with group leaders who have a special interest in and a passion for the subject. We are very appreciative of the generosity of those members who have offered to tutor the groups on a purely voluntary basis and in keeping with the spirit of U3AC.

The Summer Programme of 70 courses has also been published and circulated on line with hard copies available from the Office.

The Courses Sub-Committee would like to express it's thanks to the Office staff who have worked hard to attract tutors and compile this varied and vibrant programme of courses and activities. This is no mean achievement and the staff are to be congratulated.

Members will be aware that the committee has been scrutinising the cost of hiring outside venues and we are pleased that priority has been given to maximising the use of the Bridge Street premises with alternative provision offered to those classes where this is not available. All courses and activities have been accommodated.

May I make a special plea to members to contact the Office if they wish to withdraw from a class and also to notify the tutors. There have been a number of examples of members being allocated a place on a course and not turning up at all or attending very infrequently. Obviously there are occasions when members cannot attend classes - illness, holidays, grandparenting duties etc. - in which case an apology to the tutor is sufficient. As a matter of courtesy to tutors we do not encourage a casual 'drop in culture'. This is also unfair to those members who may have unsuccessfully applied for a place on the course and have been relegated to the waiting list. The problem is particularly significant when the tutor may have arranged talks or demonstrations from other members of the organisation providing the outside venue - eg British Antarctic Survey. The U3AC depends on the goodwill of other organisations to provide a varied programme of studies and the willingness of our members to offer their time on a voluntary basis. We all hope that members will enjoy browsing the Programme, select the courses that appeal and look forward to a rewarding year ahead.

Insurance

University of the Third Age Liability Insurance

The University of the Third Age's insurance provides members and those working on our behalf with liability cover for courses held at the University of the Third Age's premises and external hired venues. Cover is provided by the University of the Third Age for courses held in members private homes, provided the loss/injury is caused by an activity relating to a University of the Third Age course. Certain courses are not covered by University of the Third Age's insurances, and under such circumstances, insurance in relation to these courses will normally be provided by the course instructors: where this is not the case, members participate at their own risk. Activities other than those formally provided by the University of the Third Age and accepted by University of the Third Age's insurer are not covered under the above policy and no liability can be accepted in respect of these. No cover is available for excursions and holidays organised by U3AC groups. Members should therefore arrange their own insurance cover.

Annual Subscription – a reminder

The annual subscription of £63 is the fee to become a member of the organisation; it is not a payment for courses. Membership entitles you to apply for up to 6 courses, attend the Wednesday lectures and Norah Boyce science lectures (space permitting) and the opportunity to apply for various visits that are arranged throughout the year.

If you apply for only ONE course and that course has a limited number of places we cannot guarantee you a place on that course, so it is advisable to provide an alternative.

Additional Fees for Courses

Payment for any additional fees for courses is required at the time of application. Please note application forms will not be processed until additional fees are received. In the event of a place not being allocated the monies will be refunded in full.

Closing date for Applications/Allocations to Courses

We would like to receive your application for courses by 1 August. A letter giving details of which courses you have been allocated will be sent out with your membership card and newsletter at the end of August. This newsletter will include the list of Wednesday Lectures, Norah Boyce Science Lectures and the Autumn term programme for the Film Group.

Discretionary Fund

A Discretionary Fund is available for members who would find it difficult to pay the full annual subscription. To qualify for the reduced subscription of £10, members should be in receipt of either: pension credit, income support or incapacity benefit. Contact the Office on application providing written evidence of entitlement.

Personal Details

In line with Data Protection guidelines the U3AC Office does not disclose addresses (home or email) or telephone numbers to any enquirers. However, some classes, particularly leisure groups, like to have a list of members' names, addresses and telephone numbers circulated for use within the group to assist with car sharing etc. If you do **not** wish your name to be included on any such list, please make this clear on your application form

Disability Assistance

It is important that U3AC Office staff are aware of members who may need assistance in the event of an emergency evacuation from Bridge Street. Please could you indicate on your membership application form if you require help. You will then be contacted before the Autumn term to ensure that we are fully aware of what help you need.

What do you want to know from your genes?

Your genes contain information about your past, present and future medical health. It is now possible to look at all 20,000+ genes via a saliva sample. Would you want to know if you were predisposed to getting cancer or heart disease? We are conducting a research project at the Wellcome Trust Sanger Institute on attitudes towards sharing genetic information. Anyone can participate and no prior knowledge about genetics is needed; the survey has got 10 short films in it that describe all you need to know to answer the questions.
