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Messages from members of Council

Courses and Allocations 2012 – 2013

Once again we are looking forward to the start of a new academic year and the great majority of members have sent in their course bids together with their subscriptions. Not everyone has managed to keep to the requested deadline, but so far there have been 7011 course requests matched to 6307 possible course allocations and there are still 1066 free spaces on various courses.

Like most years some subjects have proved very popular and remain well beyond our modest course's capacity. There are 15 courses that have received applications in excess of the class size by factors of three, four, five and even six times. Throughout the year we hope to be able to introduce additional courses, these will be either advertised in the weekly bulletin or the newsletter and are subject to our ability to source a venue. Classrooms at Bridge Street are running at full capacity and renting extra venues is financially expensive. Our total expenditure for both internal and external venues runs into well over $\pounds 120,000$.

Turning to other matters, it looks as if our recent publicity campaign has had some success, and will be sufficient to maintain a small growth in membership number.

Our Summer Holiday Programme of courses has been hugely successful, with many of our members trying their hand at subjects not previously ventured. Thank you to all the tutors who led courses, we have received some wonderful feedback from members.

Finally a warm welcome is extended to all new entrants and best wishes to everyone with the allocations. No doubt there will be disappointments, but it is hoped these constitute the exceptions.

At present U3AC prepares its management accounts for years ending 30 June. Last year we made a small surplus, which compares with a budgeted small deficit and is good news. I am not giving precise numbers, as these are cash accounts and the numbers are distorted by the date that a bill is received and paid. We are considering moving our management accounts to a December year end, like the financial accounts, which will then allow us to deal properly with accruals (e.g. adjusting for bills that come early or late); it should also save marginally on workload, as we will only have one set of accounts.

Writing this in early August, it is still too early to say how membership numbers compare with last year. We are hoping for a small increase (to help finances) but not a big one (as we wish to maintain the ratio of course places to members).

The Group will reconvene on 6th October meeting every Saturday morning to 15th December. (10.30 coffee, Start 11.00, Finish 13.00 approx.) The BG is a multidisciplinary group founded with the intention of developing a statement made by Jacob Bronowski in the preface to his book on his TV series The Ascent of Man (1973):- "There cannot be a philosophy, there cannot be a decent science, without humanity......For me, the understanding of nature has as its goal the understanding of human nature, and of the human condition within nature." Every atrocity in the world today represents a failure of "The Humanities", their inability to demonstrate what Bronowski called "human specificity" as the premise of the world. The present concern of the BG is the nature of Language, its uses, misuses and even complete absence, in making that premise a universal reality for ethical existence in a natural universe.

From the fireside to the front lines in Spain: *The other face of war*

This talk by Angela Jackson, an invited speaker will be chaired by Nick Coni.

Angela is a Cambridge historian who has lived in Catalonia since 2001 where she has been researching and writing on the subject of the civil war. Her books on the International Brigaders and their interactions with local people, the medical services during the Battle of the Ebro and the varied roles of women in wartime, have been published in English, Spanish and Catalan. Her talk will focus on this latter theme, embracing the roles played by Spanish women on both sides and by those from other countries such as our own - including women from Cambridge. If time permits, she will show some archive footage of the Spanish Civil War.

This talk should be of interest to those who have attended the U3AC course on the SCW, those who are about to start it, and those who don't need to because they are well versed in the subject already, and all will be very welcome.

9th October Another Year

Mike Leigh has returned with a new family-and-friends group portrait, a film in which the distant sob or throb of sadness is never entirely absent. With its immersive sweetness and gentleness, this is another utterly confident and unhurried ensemble picture from Leigh, containing his distinctively extended dialogue scenes of unpointed ordinariness, and a lowered narrative heartbeat to which you have to make conscious effort to adjust. Jim Broadbent and Ruth Sheen lead an excellent cast.

16th October **The Best Intentions**

Dir: Bille August Sweden 1992 (180 mins) The epic-length story of a Swedish couple's courtship and marriage is dominated by an unborn child. The baby whose arrival is imminent as the film concludes will be Ingmar Bergman, whose screenplay looks back at the social, economic and personal forces that turned his parents' early years together into a tug of war. Directed by his trusted colleague Bille August it won the Palme d'Or at the 1992 Cannes Film Festival. Featuring Max Von Sydow and Pernilla August, who won a best actress award for her performance. NOTE THAT THIS PERFORMANCE WILL START AT 1PM.

23th October Zelia

The director uses a documentary format to create a profile of Leonard Zelig, a 20's phenomenon known as the "human chameleon." Zelig's overwhelming desire to belong is manifested in his ability to take on the facial and vocal characteristics of whomever he happens to be around at the moment. Zelig becomes a celebrity in his own right, inspiring a song, a dance craze and even a Warner Brothers biopic.

30th October Albert Nobbs

Based on a story by George Moore, an Irish realist writer, who may have known some real-life parallels in Dublin. Albert Nobbs is not a man, she is a woman who works as a butler and waiter in a 19th century Dublin hotel, where she dresses and passes as a man because a woman would not be hired for the job, and she needs the economic security. Glenn Close plays Albert and had starred in an Off-Broadway production of it in 1982, she fulfils a personal ambition in bringing it to the screen.

6th November The Burmese Harp

One of the great humanist films to come out of the 20th C world wars, the message of The Burmese Harp is not simply that war causes suffering. Nor, despite its Buddhist milieu, does the film endorse the Buddhist doctrine that suffering is caused by desire. Instead, the film declares, that we mortals do not know why suffering happens. Rather than diagnosing a cause. The Burmese Harp emphasizes the importance of compassion, humility, and spirituality in facing up to the disease. Elegantly expressed through the extraordinary visual imagery of the cinematographer Minoru Yokoyama.

13th November Inside Job

As gripping as any thriller this film is a compelling lesson in what went wrong with the banks. Aided by some fascinating interviews, the director lays out a disturbing story. In the 1980s, the markets and financial services were deregulated; Charles Ferguson's Inside Job is an angry, well-argued documentary about how the American financial industry set out deliberately to defraud the ordinary investor. Considered to be essential viewing at the time it was released.

20th November The Gospel according to St. Mathew

Dir: Pasolini Italy 1964 (137 mins) There's something deeply personal about Pier Paolo Pasolini's approach, which at times almost feels like a documentary. Christ's meeting with Satan in the desert, his healing of lepers, or his feeding of the multitude are stripped of all the grandness one would normally associate with them, and presented in such a way that even nonbelievers should find the work moving and inspiring. A truly remarkable film.

27th November Charlie Wilson's War

Dir: Mike Nichols USA 2007 (101 mins) This is Mike Nichol's, fictional tribute to the real-life congressman Charlie Wilson, an exuberant figure who in the 1980s, masterminded and funded the covert war against the Soviet Union in Afghanistan. It is a fascinating and eyeopening account of the most unlikely "difference maker" imaginable. A relatively obscure Congressman from the Second District of Texas, "Good Time Charlie" was known more for his libertine lifestyle than his libertarian legislation. Likable and licentious (even for a politician), Charlie Wilson served his constituency well since the good folks of Lufkin only really wanted two things, their guns and to be left alone.

4th December To Have and Have Not

Expatriate American Harry Morgan helps to transport a Free French Resistance leader and his beautiful wife to Martinique while romancing a sexy lounge singer. Loosely based on an Earnest Hemingway novel, the story of Henry Morgan, was rewritten by James Furman and William Faulkner. It was the first film role for the 19 year old Lauren Bacall and led to an iconic screen partnership with Humphrey Bogart as well to a marriage that endured until his death in 1957. It is also notable as one of the key screen appearances of the singer/songwriter Hoagy Carmichael.

11th December Le Havre

This is a seductively funny, offbeat and warm-hearted film with a heartfelt urgency on the subject of northern Europe's attitude to desperate refugees from the developing world. The drollery and deadpan in Kaurismäki's style in no way undermine the emotional force of this tale; they give it an ingenuous Chaplinesque simplicity that helps to make it a satisfying and distinctively lovable film.

16 October Cambridgeshire Wildlife: Past Present and Future

Brian Eversham, Chief Executive for the Wildlife Trust for Beds, Cambs & Northants

Brian Eversham has been Chief Executive for the Wildlife Trust for Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire since 2009. Previously he was head of conservation at the Trust for 12 years, following 15 years as a research ecologist at Monks Wood Experimental Station.

He will review the dramatic changes in Britain's wildlife in recent decades, caused by the interactions of climate, land use, pollution, and direct human impacts such as introduction of non-native species. Taking climate change as the biggest single factor, he will assess which species will be 'winners' and which 'losers' in a changing British climate. He will conclude by discussing how conservationists are responding to the challenges, and make some predictions of what our future wildlife may look like.

13 November The Magic of Movement: A Bird's Eye View

Professor Nicola S. Clayton, FRS

Nicky Clayton is Professor of Comparative Cognition in the Department of Experimental Psychology at the University of Cambridge, a Fellow of Clare College and a Fellow of the Royal Society. She is also Scientist in Residence at Rambert Dance Company.

Her expertise lies in the contemporary study of the development and evolution of cognition in animals and young children, integrating knowledge of both biology and psychology to introduce new ways of thinking about key issues in comparative cognition.

Nicky is fascinated by movement. As a scientist she studies how crows and children think, using their behaviour to inspire novel tests to assess their cognitive capacities. But she is also a dancer and collaborates with Mark Baldwin, the Artistic Director at Rambert Dance Company on a series of new contemporary dance pieces inspired by science. In this talk Nicky will discuss the creative process used, and the striking parallels and improbable connections between choreographer and scientist.

27 November The Resilient Brain: Cognition and Ageing

Professor Lorraine K Tyler, FBA

Lorraine K Tyler is Professor of Cognitive Neuroscience at the University of Cambridge, the director of the Centre for Speech, Language and the Brain, and Fellow of Clare College.

She heads a University-wide consortium, funded by the BBSRC, to study the relationship between brain function and cognition across the adult lifespan.

In this lecture, instead of focusing on what declines with age, she will discuss the more positive view which is starting to emerge in which ageing is no longer seen as an inexorable progressive decline in neural and cognitive fitness. This research focuses on what is preserved as we age, trying to understand the brain mechanisms by which cognitive functions can be preserved in spite of extensive changes in brain tissue. This research, that takes a positive view of changes across the life-span, is starting to over-turn existing stereotypes of ageing.
